***Kaiser ...***

\*\*\* Harley S. Kaiser is a clerk at either Marshall Fields provisions store, or Charlie Christopher's confectionery store, in the Weeks Block, corner of Central and Pleasant Streets. Harley is boarding at 3 Smith Street, the home of Paul Kaiser. (1929-31) Harley removed to Springfield, Vermont, prior to 1935. In 1938 Harley and Frederick Mayo opened the K & M Cleaners in the end space in the Weeks Block. They ran the business until about 1942.

\*\*\* Paul R. Kaiser is a machinists helper in the railroad round house. Paul and Lela A. Kaiser have a home at 3 Smith Street. (1929-31) The Kaisers' removed to Springfield, Vermont, prior to 1935.

\*\*\* Miss Pauline N. Kaiser is a student at Woodsville High School, boarding at 3 Smith Street, the home of Paul R. Kaiser. (1929-31) Pauline removed to Springfield, Vermont, prior to 1935.

***Kaiser s Restaurant ...*** located at 41 Smith Street, across from Fullerton's Motel and Garage. Built by Bernard and Candice Doe in 1957. The restaurant and dairy bar operated for many years and was then purchased by John Fullerton who sold it to the Kaisers in 1962. The Kaisers ran the restaurant until Central Street was extended from Beech street to forest Street, bypassing the "Dry Bridge" and Kaiser's Restaurant. Nazarene Church purchased the building in 1967 and it is now a private residence.

***Kane ...***

\*\*\* Edward L. Kane is an employee of the railroad. Edward and Dora B. Kane have a home at 11 Beech Street. (1953 - 1955) The Kanes have retired and are residing at 11 Beech Street. (1956 - 1958)

\*\*\* Thomas L. Kane is the blister rust agent in room 7, 13 Pleasant Street, the Odd Fellows Block. Thomas Kane is boarding at 19 School Street, the home of William E. Gibson. (1925-31) Thomas is rooming at 35 Central Street, the Sargent Block, room 16. (1935-1937)

***Kapotes ...*** Christos Kapotes purchased the "Red Mill" building on Smith Street and added a Pizza Restaurant on the lower back-side of the building, on what is now the Central Street extension, in 1991.

The mill was converted into apartments.

The building burned and Kapotes rebuilt the restaurant on Central Street where the original restaurant was located.

\*\*\* Harriet J. Kearney is boarding at 9 Perkins Place, the home of Herbert C. Kearney. (1925) Harriett is a housekeeper at 4 Mill Sreet, Hubert C. Kearney. (1935 - 1937)

\*\*\* Hubert Kearney is a chauffeur and boards at 12 King Street, the home of James Kearney. (1919) Hubert is a conductor on the railroad, boarding at 9 Perkins Place, the home of Herbert C. Kearney. (1925)

Hubert Kierney is superintendent of the Maytag Company with a home at 9 Perkins Place. (1929-31) Herbert is chauffeur for C & O Oil Co. at 20 Smith Street. (1925 - 1937)

\*\*\* James Kearney is a coal and wood teamster agent for the Gulf Refining Company. James and Harriet J. Kearney have a house at 12 King Street. (1915)(1919) James Kearney's business is local and long distance trucking at 12 King Street. (1925) 72 Mill Street (1929-31) James is rooming at 43 Central Street, the Henderson Hotel, room 10. (1935 - 1937) James is living in the Thompson Block at 55 Central Street. (1953 - 1955)

\*\*\* Mrs. Jennie Kearney is a housekeeper at Hubert C. Kearney at 4 Perkins Place, where Jennie boards. (1929-31)

***Keene ...*** Elmer L. Keene is a traveling salesman for De Laval Separator Company (NYC). Elmer and Florence L. Keene have a home at 9 Walnut Street. (1929-31)

***Keezer ...*** Arthur W. Keezer died on May 10, 1950.

***Keith ...***

\*\*\* Frank Keith is a foreman on the railroad and boarding at 10 Forest Street, at the home of Lawrence K. Butson. (1953 - 1955)

\*\*\* Wilson W. Keith is a fireman on the railroad. Wilson and Virginia L. Keith reside at 3 Beech Street. (1956 - 1958)

***Kelleher ...*** Robert L. Kelleher is a clerk at the Woodsville National Bank and boards at 20 School Street, the home of George N. Spaulding. (1919)

***Kelley ...*** Guy R. Kelley is a clerk on the railroad. Guy and Lauren M. Kelley have a home at 139 Central Street. (1935 - 1937) The Kelley's purchased the Fred Mann general store in the Rowden Block, 115-119 Central Street, in the early 40's and operate a grocery and provisions store. Known in the past as the Rowden Block and now as the Kelley Block. In 1945 Mr. Rowden sold the building to H. O. Taylor, who later sold it to the Kelley's. The Kelley's bought out Bill Hartwell who operated the meat market in the other half of the building, in 1950. The building burned in 1950 and the Kelley's immediately rebuilt as one store and operated as a IGA Supermarket. In 1964, due to Guy's health, the Kelley's sold the store to their son, Guy, Jr. Guy later sold to Paul and Marguerite Boucher, who sold to Joseph and Gloria Kraniak. The store closed in 1964. The Kelleys' are living on the back road to Bath. (1953 - 1958)

***Kendall ...***

\*\*\* Louise A. Kendall, widow of George H. Kendall, is boarding at 6 Walnut Street, the home of Nelson J. Miller, Ice delivery. (1929-31) Louise is boarding at 22 Beech Street, the home of Mrs. Belle B. Burton. (1935 - 1937) Louise has a home at 6 Walnut Street. (1953 - 1955)

\*\*\* Sherman Kendall works in a wood working shop in North Woodstock, NH. Virginia Kendall is teaching English and Latin at Woodsville High School. (1953 - 1967)

\*\*\* Dale Kendall is a student at Woodsville High School, residing with Sherman and Virginia Kendall. (1956 - 1958) Dale operates Paige Computer Service, is retired from the service and is on the Library board. Carole Kendall, Mrs. Dale., worked for Woodsville High School for many years and retired in 2008. Carol's father was George Veayo, Cromwell & Veayo Garage, in Wells River, Vermont.

\*\*\* George H Kendall of Bristol, NH, is the register of deeds in 1898. He is busily preparing a new index for the registry.

***Kenerson ...*** William S. Kenerson is district manager of Standard Oil Company of NY. William and Elizabeth S. Kenerson have a home at 6 Holly Street. (1925)

***Keniston...*** Bert Keniston is a farmhand in Bath, NH. Bert and Mary Keniston have a home at 4 Ammonoosuc Street. (1929-31)

***Kennedy ...***

**\*\*\* John B. Kennedy is a student, boarding at 8 Elm Street, the home of Sylvester and Goldie Kennedy. (1935 - 1937) John is works at 40 Central Street, in the B&M baggage room. Doris A. Kennedy is a registered nurse at Cottage Hospital, on River Road. John and Doris Kennedy have a home at 8 Elm Street. (1953 - 1958)**

**\*\*\* Kevin B. Kennedy is assistant Grafton County Agent. Kevin and Joan B. Kennedy reside at 12 Pine Street. (1956 - 1958)**

**\*\*\* Sylvester P. Kennedy was born in 1887. Later in life he was a trainman and moved to Concord, NH. He then came to Woodsville as a trainman and lives at 22 Elm Street with his wife, Goldie M. Kennedy. (1915) (1919) Sylvester is a conductor on the railroad. He and Goldie now live at 8 Elm Street. (1935 - 1937) The Kennedy's removed to 1 Beacon Street, Concord, NH, prior to 1953.**

***Kennison ...***

**\*\*\* Warren W. Kennison is an engineer for the B&M railroads steam crane. He and Marion Kennison live at 35 Ammonoosuc Street (1919). Same as William W. Kennison ??.**

**\*\*\* William W. Kennison is an engineer for the B&M railroads steam crane. He has a house in Wells River, Vt. (1915). Also listed as Warren W. Kenniston, 35 Ammonoosuc Street ?? (1919).**

***Kent ...***

**\*\*\* Della E. Kent, widow of Joseph F. Kent, boards at H. C. Wallace's. (1919)**

**\*\*\* Harry F. Kent is a farmhand and is currently rooming at Mrs. H. C. Wallace's on Wallace Hill. (1915) (1919) Harry Kent, in 1920, inherited the Wallace (Hastings)farm from his mother. Harry Kent sold the farm to Perry Hastings 8-25-1920. Harry and Sadie B. Kent removed to California between 1920 and 1925.**

**\*\*\* Joseph F. Kent is a farmer. He and Della E. Kent room at Mrs. H. C. Wallace's on Wallace Hill. Joseph died November 10th, 1916. Joseph purchased the farm, earlier known as the Atkinson Farm, in 1909. Harry Kent inherited the farm from his mother and later sold it to Perry Hasting.**

**Kessler ...** Alfred and Frances Kessler removed to Buffalo, NY, prior to 1935.

\*\*\* Miss Beulah I. Keyes is a student at Woodsville High School, boarding at 9 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of Walter C. Keyes. (1925) Beulah is employed in Springfield, Mass. and boarding at 9 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of Walter C. Keyes. (1929 - 1937)

\*\*\* Della J. Keyes, widow of Walter C. Keyes, is residing at 9 Ammonoosuc Street. (1956 - 1958)

\*\*\* Luther C. Keyes is a fireman on the railroad. Luther and Margaret O. Keyes have a home at 10 Cherry Street. (1953 - 1958)

\*\*\* Henry W. Keyes, Jr., is a director of Woodsville national Bank and an attorney in Boston. Henry and Betty Keyes reside in Newton, Mass., and North Haverhill, NH. (1956 - 1958)

\*\*\* Walter C. Keyes is a trainman for the B&M railroad. He and Della J. have a house at 9 Ammonoosuc Street (1919). Walter, along with being a trainman, is operating Woodsville Battery Station, authorized Exide battery dealer, at 8 North Court Street. Walter and Della J. Keyes have a home at 9 Ammonoosuc Street. (1925 - 1937) Walter Keyes passed away prior to 1953. Della is still living at 9 Ammonoosuc Street. (1953 - 1958)

\*\*\* Walter F. Keyes is a turnkey at Grafton County Farm, where he boards. (1953 - 1955)

\*\*\* William F. Keyes died on February 28th, 1955.

\*\*\* Walter F. Keyes, Jr. has a welding business on Forest Street, in Woodsville. He built the building in 1946 and ran the welding business for 40 years. William (Bill) Keyes died in 2008.

**\*\*\* Miss Doris Keyser is a student at Woodsville High School, boarding at 151 Central Street, the home of James J. Powers. (1929-31)**

**\*\*\* F. Ray Keyser removed to Chelsea, Vermont, prior to 1943.**

**\*\*\* Mrs. Mary E. Keyser is boarding on Oak Hill. (1919)**

**\*\*\* Harry J. Keyser is a trainman for the railroad. Harry and Lillis P. Keyser have a home at 13 Ammonoosuc Street. (1925-31) The Keyser's now have a home at 17 North Court Street. (1935 - 1937)**

**\*\*\* Ray Keyser is a student at Woodsville High School. He is boarding at 2 Central Street (the toll house), the home of Winfield F. Keyser. (1919)**

**\*\*\* Roland W. Keyser is a student at Woodsville High School. He is boarding at 2 Central Street (the toll house), the home of Winfield F. Keyser. (1919)**

**\*\*\* Miss Virginia P. Keyser is a student at Woodsville High School, boarding at 13 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of Harry J. Keyser. (1929-31) Virginia is employed at the A&P Store and still boarding with Harry and Lillis Keyser. (1935 - 1937)**

**\*\*\* Winfield S. Keyser lived in the toll house by the double decker bridge. His family was in charge of collection tolls from 1914-1917. Winfield is the baggage master for the B&M railroad. He and Harriet B. Keyser are living at 2 Central Street (the toll house), the home of Winfield F. Keyser. (1919) Winfield's home is at 151 Central Street. (1925) The Keyser's removed to Plymouth, NH. , prior to 1931.**

***In Woodsville, three brothers in the Keyser family, Frank, Winfield, and Harry, were railroad men, occasionally serving on the same train as the entire crew - as conductor, baggage master, and flagman. Winfield and his family lived at the toll house and were toll-keepers from 1914-17.***

**\*\*\* Edwin Kezer is a freight clerk for the B&M RR and is rooming at B. A. Bailey's on Perkins Place (1915).**

**\*\*\* Francis J. Kezer (1848-1891) was a railroad employee in Woodsville for many years. Sarah, his widow has her home at 14 Highland Street. (1919) (1925)**

**\*\*\* Miss Geraldine Kezer is a telephone operator at New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, 13 Pleasant Street, the Odd Fellows Block, room #1. Geraldine is rooming at 15 North Court Street above C. A. Butson's meat and provisions store. (1935 - 1937)**

**\*\*\* Sarah E. Kezer, widow of Francis Kezer, is boarding at 19 Pleasant Street, the home of Charles S. Emery. (1929-31)**

***Kidder ...***

**\*\*\* Miss Alice M. Kidder is a student at Woodsville High School and boards at 21 Pleasant Street. (1919)**

**\*\*\* Mrs. Anna K. Kidder is a housekeeper for G. A. Workman's on Pleasant Street and Anna rooms there. (1915) (1919) Anna is employed at Chamberlin's Greenhouse, just across the covered bridge, in Bath. Anna resides at 3 Gibson Place. (1956 - 1958)**

**\*\*\* Donald E. Kidder is in the U. S. Army. Don and Virginia B. Kidder board with her parents, A. J. Beaton, on Melody Lane. (1953 - 1955)**

**\*\*\* Miss Dorothy Kidder is student at Woodsville High School, boarding at 19 Central Street, the Home of Ernest F. Kidder. (1953 - 1955)**

**\*\*\* Miss Emma F. Kidder is boarding at 14 Mapel Street, the home for the aged. (1925)**

\*\*\* Ernest F. Kidder is employed in St. Johnsbury, Vermont. Ernest F. and Anna M. Kidder have a home at 19 Central Street. (1953 - 1955) The Kidders' are residing at 9 Gibson Place. (1956 - 1958)

\*\*\* George H. Kidder is assistant superintendent of the B&M railroad, with a home in Wells River, Vermont. (1925)

\*\*\* Henry T. Kidder is a clerk and rooms at Mrs. Merrill's Court Street Lodge on South Court Street. (1915)

\*\*\* Mrs. Leila C. Kidder is a registered nurse with a home at 143 Central Street. (1929-31) Leilla, widow of James Kidder, is boarding at 33 Mill Street. (1935 - 1937)

***Kiley ...*** William M. Kiley is a teamster. He and Jennie E. Kiley have a house on Perkins Place. (1915) In later years Henry became a salesman for the Standard Oil Company and the Kiley's have a home at 5 1/2 Elm Street. (1919)

***Kimball ...***

\*\*\* Mrs. Alice M. Kimball is boarding at 25 Connecticut Street, the home of Ray L. Kimball. (1919)

\*\*\* Amos Kimball was born on August 31, 1750. Amos was a resident of Haverhill, NH, and he was the builder of the first bridge across the Connecticut River, in Woodsville. The location was just south of the community field on the west end of Ferry Street. At one time there was a toll house by the river's edge. Ferry Street is directly across from the foot of Cheney Hill, on South Court Street.

Amos Kimball purchased what was known as the Atkinson Farm on January 27th, 1795. He bought it from George King Sparhawk and later, (4-23-1827) sold it to John Angier. Angier was a doctor and the old cottage hospital building was built for Dr. Angier in 1827. The doctor was killed after being thrown from his buggy in 1836. Records show Dr. Angier sold the Atkinson farm the same day he purchased it! The land was later known as Wallace Hill and is now Hastings Hill. Angier sold the farm to Dudley C. Kimball. It is likely only a part of the farm was sold because Dr. Angier later sold the farm, or part of it, to Francis D. Kimball on January 8th, 1828.

Amos Kimball sold it back to Angier a day later! And, Dr. Angier then sold it to Windsor Cobleigh on April 9th, 1838. Go to the "H" file (Hastings) for the complete sale history of this property.

**\*\*\* Frank E. Kimball (1861-1916 was a member of the firm of Kimball & Nutter, horse dealers with stables in Woodsville. Frank Kimball was a Republican and Congregationalist and with his death in December of 1916 the male line of Dudley C. Kimball became extinct.**

**\*\*\* Mrs. Genevieve Kimball has a home at 6 Highland Street. (1919) Genevieve is employed at 30 Railroad Street, Holbrook Grocery Company. (1925 - 1937) Genevieve is employed at 6 School Street, Dr. Elmer F. Miller. Genevieve has a home at 6 Highland Street. (1953 - 1955) Genevieve died on June 10th, 1955.**

**\*\*\* Jane Kimball, widow of Ezra Kimball, boards at 37 Highland Street, the home of Nathan E. Rutledge. (1919)**

**\*\*\* Joseph Porter Kimball (1826-1903) lived on a farm south of Woodsville, owned by his father Dudley Carleton Kimball. Joseph married Mary A. Brock. He was a Republican and Congregationalist. He died on August 12th, 1903.**

**\*\*\* Martha Kimball, widow of Aaron Kimball is boarding at 11 Ammonoosuc Street. (1919)(1925)**

**\*\*\* Miss Mildred Kimball is a student at Plymouth Normal School, boarding at 6 Highland Street, the home of Mrs. Genevieve Kimball. (1925)**

**\*\*\* Ray E. Kimball is a fireman for the B&M RR. Ray and Della have a house on Perkins Place (1915). Ray and Della have removed to Scotts. (1919)**

**\*\*\* Ray L. Kimball is a carpenter and has a house at 25 Connecticut Street. (1919)**

**\*\*\* Kimball and Nutter are horse dealers on Pleasant Street. (1919) is a fireman for the B&M RR. Ray and Della have a house on Perkins Place (1915).**

\*\*\* William W. Kimball is a laborer at Acer Lumber Company. William and Myrtle M. Kimball have a home at 45 Smith Street. (1925)

***Kinkson ...*** Forrest Kinkson is a lumberman. Forrest and Elizabeth A. Kinkson have a home at 14 Nelson Street. (1953 - 1955)

***King ...***

\*\*\* Betsey King married Eli L. Evans on 3-19-1887. Eli died on March 4th, 1880. They settled in Woodsville.

\*\*\* Charles King is a teacher at Woodsville High School and rooms at G. H. Hood's on Chapel Street (1915).

\*\*\* Charles Russell King. 1845 is when Charles Russell King was born. He was the son of Russell King, a sheep farmer and wool producer on South Court Street. Charles was in the employ of the railroad until 1863 when he moved to Pittsburg, Pa.

\*\*\* Edward J. King operates a cafe and restaurant in the Henderson Block on Central Street. The café is in the right front space, beside Kugelman's store. Edward has a house in St. Johnsbury, Vt. (1915)

\*\*\* Francis E. King is a clerk. He and Jessie King have a house at 22 Elm Street. (1919)

\*\*\* Frank P. King is a carpenter at H. P. Cummings Construction Company. Frank and Millie A. King have a house at 6 Highland Street. (1915) (1919) The Kings removed to Keene, prior to 1925.

\*\*\* Henry Franklin King 1838-1905 Henry Franklin King, Russell's son was born February 13th, 1838 and died on November 2nd, 1905. Henry was, early on, employed by the railroad in Penna. After returning to Woodsville, to the farm, he became a selectman, deputy sheriff, and was in the legislature in 1899-1901. He was a Republican and Episcopalian and one of the first Woodsville Fire Department commissioners, in 1887.

\*\*\* John King is a clerk at Armour & Company and rooms at 40 Railroad Street, the home of Mrs. Laura E. Hoit. (1925) John King removed to Portsmouth, NH, prior to 1931.

\*\*\* Louva King, widow of Henry F. King, has a house at 56 North Court Street. (1919) (1925)

**\*\*\* Russell King, and brother Hiram, came to Woodsville in 1835 and purchased the Moses Little Farm , containing approximately 400 acres of tall white pine timber.**

**The King farm house on Cheney hill is most likely the oldest home in Woodsville.**

**Russell was also accompanied by his father William King, his wife's sister Sally Walker, and his wife Ann Walker King.**

**Russell King was born on January 26th, 1801 and died on March 13th, 1874. He was a member of the Whig party, a Congregationalist and a legislator in 1857-1858.**

***Kipperman ...* Maurice and Claire H. Kipperman removed to Pelham Manor, NY, prior to 1953.**

***Kirk ...***

**... Harold A. Kirk is employed at 7 Forest Street, Eastern States Farmers Exchange, residing in McIndoes Falls. Vt. (1955-1958)**

**\*\*\* Harold B. Kirk is a signalman at Wells River. Harold and Madeline M. Kirk have a home at 12 Locust Street. (1925) Harold passed away prior to 1935. Madeline has a home at 6 Maple Street. (1935 - 1937) Harold passed away prior to 1953. Madeline is the bookkeeper for the Grafton County Commissioners and she is living at 38 Ammonoosuc Street. (1953 - 1958)**

***Kittredge ...***

**\*\*\* Eugene O. Kittredge is an engineer. He and Mabel have a home at 56 South Court Street. (1919)**

**\*\*\* Frank K. Kittredge operated a carriage business in store #3 on the street level of the new Odd Fellows Block. Kittredge sold carriages, buggies and what was left of his jewelry stock. He later moved what was left of the business to his home on Maple Street. Frank K. and Abbie S. Kittredge have a home at 13 Maple Street. (1919 - 1931) Frank passed away prior to 1935. Abbie has a home at 13 Maple Street. (1935 - 1937)**

**\*\*\* Lydia Kittredge is boarding at 5 North Court Street. (1953 - 1958)**

**\*\*\* Miss Pauline L. Kittredge is a student at Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in Boston. She boards at 13 Maple Street at the home of Frank Kittridge. (1919)**

(1935 - 1955) Joan is residing at 40 King Street. (1956 - 1958) Joan was memorialized on a brass plaque, on a granite boulder, off central Street, across from the book store. The plaque reads, "In memory of Winnifred Moran and Joan Knight, a Civic Improvement Project by Woodsville Progressive Club, 1991." The honor was in reference to an ongoing landscaping project, for the improvement of Woodsville.

\*\*\* Moren A. Knight is retired and boarding at W. V. Ashley's on School Street. (1919) Boarding at 17 Maple Street, the home of Wm. V. Ashley. (1925) Moren is retired and boarding at 17 Maple Street, the home of Wm. V. Ashley. (1929-31) Moren died prior to 1935.

\*\*\* Nathan S. Knight, born on April 20th, 1849, has worked for the B&M railroad for twenty years, is in the Odd Fellows and belongs to the Methodist-Episcopalian Church. (1915) Nathan married Vina Hubbard on March 6th, 1871. Vina, born October 28th, 1856. Nathan S. and Vina R. Knight are boarding at 18 Maple Street, at Nathan S. Knight's. (1919) The Knights have a home at 18 Maple Street. (1925-31) The Knights moved into the Odd Fellows Nurning Home in Concord, NH, because of poor health, in 1932. Nathan passed away on August 21st, 1934.

The Knights managed the first hotel in Woodsville, the Parker House. Vina and Mrs. E. E. Brown conducted millinery parlors after leaving the Parker House.

Clarence is a bookkeeper at Jock Oil Company, in Wells River, Vermont. Clarence and Marion Garland Knox, and son John, have a home at 14 Highland Street. (1953 - 1958) John Henry Knox was christened in the Universalist Church, May 24th, 1942.

\*\*\* Henry S. Knox is a clerk at Holbrook Grocery on Railroad Street. Henry and Flora M. Knox have a house on Highland Street. (1915). Henry Knox was acting Chief of Police after Ted Hobbs died in 1955, until Alfred Lamarre took over in 1957. Lamarre was chief from 1957 until 1964 when John Roden became chief. Henry and Flora M. Knox are living at 16 Highland Street. (1919-31) Henry is a salesman for The Loose Wiles Biscuit Company and the Knoxs' still live at 16 Highland Street. (1935 - 1937) Henry is a salesman for the Sunshine Biscuit Company ( Claremont). The Knoxs' still live at 16 Highland Street. (1953 - 1958)

**\*\*\* Levi Kugelman was a very successful businessman in Woodsville. The Kugelman family was in business here for nearly 60 years. Levi and wife Rosa first ran the ladies apparel and fancy goods store on the Pleasant Street side of the Weeks Block, on the corner of Central and Pleasant Streets. The store was here from 1911 to 1914.**

**In 1914 Levi moved the store to the new Henderson Block and was the first tenant in the building, moving in as it was being completed.**

**Kugelman's and King's Cafe were on each side of the doorway to Henderson's Moving Picture Theater.**

**Levi Kugelman moved his store back into the Weeks Block in 1921 and passed away in 1933.**

**In 1938 Mrs. Kugelman, Rosa, and son Robert, moved the store up the street to 83 Central Street, the Glover Block, 83 Central Street.**

**This building was also known as the Gibson Block and the Spofford Block. It was the location of many drug stores. Kugelman purchased the building in 1946 and sold everything in 1969.**

**\*\*\* Miss Henrietta Kugelman is a student at Simmons College, Boston, boarding at 33 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Levi Kugelman. (1925)**

**\*\*\* Miss Meda Kugelman is a student at Plymouth Normal School, boarding at 33 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Levi Kugelman. (1925) Meda is a teacher in NYC, boarding at 33 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of Levi Kugelman. (1929-31)**

**\*\*\* Robert Kugelman is a student at Woodsville High School and boarding with his parents at 37 Ammonoosuc Street. (1919) Robert is a salesman at 57 Central Street, Kugelman's Store in the Weeks-Thompson Block, boarding at 33 Ammonoosuc Street, the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Levi Kugelman. (1925 - 1958)**
