Samaha ... Unwar J. Samaha is the clerk of Courts at 33 South Court Street. Unwar "Sam" and Dorothy Samaha have a home at 30 Maple Street. "The location of this house is where the first house in Woodsville was built and became the King family home." (1953 - 1958)

Sanborn ...

*** Bradley H. Sanborn is a blacksmith at S. L. Mc Vetys He has a house on North Court Street. (1915) Bradley has removed to Bradford, NH. (1919)

*** C. Will Sanborn is a freight conductor on the railroad. Will rooms at 35 Central Street, room 6 1/2, in the Sargent Block. (1929-31)

*** Charlotte E. Sanborn, widow of Henry E. Sanborn, is boarding at 28 Maple Street, the home of Dennison Rouhan. (1925) Charlotte is boarding at Roscoe Rinehart's at 34 South Court Street. (1929-31)

*** Earl C. Sanborn is a brakeman for the railroad. He and Madeline Sanborn have a house on King Street. (1915) The Sanborn's home is at 14 Maple Street in 1919. The Sanborn's home is at 10 Perkins Place. (1919 - 1937)

... Mrs. Nellie Sanborn takes in lodgers at 17 North Court Street. (1919)

Sanders ...

*** Frank H. Sanders is a fireman on the railroad. Frank and Emma A. Sanders have a home at 17 North Court Street. (1925) The Sanders have a home at 17 Ammonoosuc Street. (1929-31)

*** Lawrence N. Sanders is an employee at 39 Central Street, the Hotel Wentworth, where Lawrence is boarding. (1953 - 1958)

*** Raymond F. Sanders is a mechanic at H. O. Taylors in Wells River, Vermont. Raymond and Edith C. Sanders live at 85 Central Street. (1953 - 1955) Raymond and Dorothy K. Sanders reside at 30 Court Street, in the Marshall Fields house. (1956 - 1958)

Sandstrom ... Mrs. Marcia R. Sandstrom is a housekeeper for Frank Weare on Mill Street. Marcia rooms there. (1915) Marcia is boarding at 13 North Court Street in 1919. Marcia is boarding at 13 King Street in 1925.

Santan ... William A. Santan is a sawyer in Newbury, Vermont. William and Marjorie R. Santan reside at 22 Connecticut Street. (1956 - 1958)

Santy ... Miss Stella Santy is night supervisor at Cottage Hospital where she boards. (1929-31)

Sargent ...

*** Albert E. Sargent and Henrietta Marshall were married around 1870. Henrietta Sargent lived from 1853 until her passing on August 10th, 1942. After the death of her husband, Albert, Mrs. Sargent lived with her son. Ernest A. Sargent, a prominent businessman in Woodsville.

*** Ernest A. Sargent purchased the building at 35 Central Street, Woodsville, NH in 1904.

Ernest, born 10-3-1874, remodeled the D. A. Barrows Store into a three story building. He was a successful clothier for many years. The store became Sargent's One Price cash Store, Hovey's Shops, and is now (2008) Hubert's.

E. A. Sargent had a house on the corner of Central and Pine Streets and was a member of the Board of Education, Trustee in the Woodsville Guaranty Savings Bank, Selectman in 1918-1919, a Republican and Episcopalian.

Mr. Sargent had an artesian well dug on his front lawn and had a small building erected around it. At that time the water was not fit for drinking. Mr. Sargent locked the well house and sold keys to residence so they could obtain good drinking water. (1919-31) Mr E. A. Sargent is still operating Sargents Store, at 37 Central Street and still at the homestead at 155 Central Street. (1935 - 1937) Ernest and Marion M. Sargent are still operating the store and living at 155 Central Street. (1953 - 1955) Mary Sargent died on March 26th, 1955.

*** Mrs. Ethel B. Sargent is a dressmaker and has a home at 19 Highland Street. (1953 - 1958)

***** Fred Lowell Sargent was born (11-30-1874). At maturity he became a train master for the railroad and was Treasurer of the Woodsville Aquaduct Company. He was a Democrat and Universalist and postmaster from 1936 to 1950.**

***** Frederick L. and Martha L. Sargent roomed at A.H. Leighton's on Maple Street after he became chief clerk in the superintendents office of the railroad. (1915) The Sargent's are rooming at 9 Maple Street. (1919) (1925) Frederick owns Nash Woodsville Company with Henry Lothar, a car dealer and repairs, on River Road, and Independent Auto Livery, 47a Central Street, in back of Spofford Drugs, in the Henderson Block. (1929 - 1937) The Sargents are retired at 9 Maple Street. (1953 - 1955)**

***** George W. Sargent is a fireman for the B&M RR. George and Ethel Sargent have a house at 48 Ammonoosuc Street.(1915)(1919) Ethel is a dressmaker. George is an engineer and the Sargent's are living at 19 Highland Street. Also have the Wee House on Davis Road. (1925 - 1958)**

***** Miss Janice M. Sargent graduated from Woodsville High School in 1925 and enrolled at Kendall School. She is a student at Miss Wheelock's school in Boston. Janice is boarding at 155 Central Street, the home of E. A Sargent. (1929-31) Janice is teaching and still boarding at 155 Central Street, the home of E. A Sargent. (1935 - 1937) Janice is teaching in Philadelphia, Penna., and still boarding with the Sargents at 155 Central Street. (1953 - 1958)**

***** Miss Laura R. Sargent is a student at Woodsville High School, boarding at 155 Central Street, the home of Ernest A. Sargent. (1925)**

***** Lemuel G. Sargent is an employee at the D. S. Stone Lumber Co. Lemuel and Nancy J. Sargent have a house on Terrace Street. (1915)(1919) The Sargents are now living on Depot Street, in North Haverhill. (1925)**

***** Leslie B. Sargent is a lineman for the White Mountain Telephone Company on Pleasant Street. Leslie rooms at 42 Railroad Street, the home of Benjamin Boothroyd. (1919)**

***** Mrs. Martha L. Sargent is clerk of Probate and living at 9 Maple Street (1919) (1925-31)**

*** Miss Muriel M. Sargent is a student at Wheaton Seminary, boarding at 155 Central Street, the home of Ernest A. Sargent. (1925)

*** Miss Pearl A. Sargent is club agent at 13 Pleasant Street, room 7, the Farm Bureau. Pearl is boarding at 6 Pine Street, the home of William R. Atwood. (1925)

*** Ronald B. Sargent is working for the summer of 1942 at Ed Clark's Dog Ranch in North Woodstock, NH.

Ronald and Kay operate Ward's Food Store on Central Street and Fountain Court Cabins on Davis Road. (1953 - 1958)

*** Mrs. Violet E. Sargent is night operator at the White Mount Telephone Company on Pleasant Street. She rooms at 17 Beech Street, the home of Mrs. Mae L. Shute. (1919)

*** William H. Sargent is a farmer and rooms at Mrs. L. M. Moffett's on Ammonoosuc Street (1915). William has removed to St. Johnsbury, Vermont. (1919)

*** William Dyer Sargent arrived in Woodsville (1894) in charge of the railroad repair shops. Previously he had been a locomotive engineer. William was born on 5-18-1838 and died on 10-8-1908. He was a loyal Democrat and member of the Universalist Church.

Sargent s Tea Room... Also called Wee House Tea Room. The tea room was in a location near what is now the elementary school. There was a gateway to Woodsville close by. The Sargent's also had a cabin colony across the street (Rt. 302). GeorgeBartsis bought the property in 1968 and opened the barge Inn. This restaurant was recently (2008) reopened as Shiloh Restaurant, featuring cabin cooking.

*** Albert Clarke Sault was born. (4-10-1881) He was an employee of the telephone company, served three terms as fire commissioner, a Republican and Episcopalian by faith. In 1915 Albert became a trunk line patrolman for the NET & T Co. Albert and Mae M. Sault have a house on the corner of Beech and Smith Streets (1915).

Albert is a trunk line patrolman for NET & T Co., living at 7 Smith Street in 1919. 8 Smith Street in 1925. Albert is an inspector for NET & T Co. The Saults are living at 4 Pine Street. (1929-31)

*** George A. Sault is a student at Woodsville High School, boarding at 4 Pine Street, the home of Albert Sault. (1929-31)

*** Miss Helen I. Sault is a student at Woodsville High School, boarding at 8 Smith Street, the home of Albert Sault. (1925)

*** Miss Thelma E. Sault is a student at Baypath Institute, boarding at 8 Smith Street, the home of Albert Sault. (1925)

Savage ...

*** George R. Savage was rector at St. Luke's Episcopal church. (1913-1915)

*** Mr. Savage is teaching at Woodsville High School. He is also coaching Junior Varsity Basket Ball and Soccer, 1961.

*** Steven Savage was Chief of Police. (1977-1986)

Savoy ...

*** Arcade "Cuddy" J. and Elsie M. Savoy operate a lunchroom at 4 Beech Street. "Savoy's Dining Room"(1953 - 1960) tele. 7-3601 and their hours were 6am - 5:30pm, closed Sunday. Mr. Savoy later became the cook at Cottage Hospital on Swiftwater Road.

*** Edward Savoy was Chief of Police. (1995-)

*** Robert Savoy is a student at Woodsville High School, residing at 4 Beech Street. (1953 - 1955)

Sawyer ...

*** Benjamin Sawyer is a carpenter with a house at Perkins Place. (1919) Benjamin is boarding at 36 Ammonoosuc St. (1925-37)

***** C. Murray Sawyer is the deputy clerk of courts, Grafton County Court House, 33 South Court Street. Murray has a home in Bath, NH. (1935 - 1937)**

***** Charles Wesley Sawyer was born on April 4th, 1864. He moved to Woodsville in 1895 and engaged in the drugstore business. Mr. Sawyer bought the Glover Building to house his business. He advertised "Sawyer's headache Powders", sold bicycles and had a soda fountain. He sold the business in 1905 to George H. Clark, an employee. (See Clark, George H.) Mr. Sawyer removed to Concord, NH. in 1912. The business is now "Shadowbox" a framing and art supplies store at 83 Central Street.**

***** Dana Sawyer is a local junk dealer. (1942)**

***** Earl W. Sawyer is a clerk at Rhett Scruggs Hardware, rooming at 30 Smith Street. (1925)**

***** Mrs. Elizabeth Sawyer is a clerk at the Public Welfare Department, 35 Central Street, the Sargent Block. Elizabeth has a home at 65 Central Street. (1953 - 1955)**

***** Harry J. Sawyer is the manager at Armour Wholesale Meat Company at 38 Railroad Street. Harry and Lillian E. Sawyer have a home on 42 Ammonoosuc Street. (1935 - 1937) Harry and Lillian E. Sawyer now have a home on 31 Smith Street. (1953 - 1955) The Sawyers removed to Bennington, Vermont prior to 1956.**

***** Herbert Sawyer is a laborer. Herbert and Bertha Sawyer have a home off Park Street. (1925) The Sawyer's have a home on Wilson Ave. (1929 - 1937)**

***** James A. Sawyer was one of the first Woodsville Fire Department commissioners, in 1887. James has a house at 12 Pine Street. (1919) James Sawyer died in 1921.**

***** Leonard S. Sawyer, partner in Edes and Sawyer, attorneys in rooms 3, 4 and 5, in the Opera Block, second floor. Leonard resides at 6 Pine Street and in Woodstock, NH. (1956 - 1958)**

***** Mrs. Phoebe H. Sawyer has a home at 8 Connecticut Street. (1935 - 1937)**

*** Remembrance C. Sawyer is a rural mail carrier, with a home at 4 Ammonoosuc Street. (1925-31) Remembrance retired and removed to Newbury, Vermont, prior to 1935.

*** Robert C. Sawyer is employed by Marsh Construction Co., at 63 Central Street, in the Opera Block. Herbert and Phyllis H. Sawyer have a home at 20 Beech Street. (1929-31) The Sawyers removed to Ossipee, NH, prior to 1935.

*** W. H. Sawyer rooms at 11 North Court Street. (1919)

Saxby ... Mrs. Della Saxby, widow of Edward H. Saxby, is living in the Sargent Block, room 9. (1953 - 1955) Della is a housekeeper at 8 Connecticut Street, the home of Lonnie Adams. Della resides at 35 Central Street, the Sargent Block, room 9. (1956 - 1958)

Scallon ... Ethel M. Scallon, widow of Thomas Scallon who died in December of 1927, has a home at 6 Nelson Street. (1929-31)

Schaefer ... J. Henry Schaefer operated a restaurant in both the Parker House and Sargent Block. Henry has a house in Wells River, Vt. (1915). Henry is operating the dance pavilion on No Man's Island from 1921 until it washed down the river in the 1927 flood. Henry J. Schaefer removed to Hanover, NH, prior to 1931.

Scheller ... George F. Scheller is proprietor at 107-111 central Street, The Photo Lab. George and Erlene N. Scheller reside at 13 King Street. (1956 - 1958)

Schoff ... Mrs. Maude Schoff is a housekeeper at 33 Park Street, the home of Arthur H. Dow, where she boards. (1953 - 1958)

Schools ... Elementary School (1900-1961). This was the third school house in Woodsville school district. There was an earlier one by the corner of Rt. 10 and swiftwater Road that wasn't in the district, at the time. The first, in the school district, was at the bottom of Clay Hill (1847-1892), the second was a wood building on School Street and was used from 1873 -1899. The brick elementary school was built in 1900 and burned in 1961. It had five feet granite, above ground, over the foundation, around the entire building. There was a granite date marker in one corner of the building, with-in this granite area. It was hauled off after the fire and not seen again. Many history buffs in town were upset that an important landmark was gone, assumingly

forever. Alas, Roland Moore, a long time resident, located the remains in the creek in Hitchcock meadows. He had it trucked to a safe location and it is, as far as I know, going to be placed in the new Railroad Park. All should be thankful for people like Rollie who are interested in preserving historical items of our town.

The elementary school principals were L. B. Purmort in 1893 and A. B. Libbey in 1896.

In the 40's and 50's there you could go to the school grounds any evening and there would be 20-25 kids ready to play lick-s-ball, basketball or shoot a friendly game of marbles.

Everyone had their favorite marble holes at different places around the building. There was a long set of swings in the lower part of the playgrounds, near the library.

A favorite thing for older kids was to swing them hard enough to wind them up and over the top pipe. This must have driven "Chubby" George, the janitor, crazy!

After the fire the children were placed in various buildings until the new school was built in 1962, near the corner of Rt. 302 and Rt. 10.

Vladimir Leskowitz, instructor in Woodsville Graded Achool, has resigned and removed to North Woodstock, NH. (1942)

Schuyler ... Mrs. Dorothy B. Schuyler is teaching at Woodsville Graded School and living in Lisbon, NH. (1953 - 1955)

School Board ... 1966 and before, the three member board consisted of Harold Taylor, Jr., Edwin Chamberlin, and Marion Mann.

Scott ... General Quincy A. Scott, with his brother-in-law, Albert H Leighton, set up a clothing and dry goods business in the Weeks Block, corner of Pleasant and Central Street, in Woodsville in 1893. The business was first called A. H. Leighton & Co., "The Peoples Clothing Store."

In 1884 the store was called Scott & Leighton. Quincy Scott bought out Mr. Leighton in 1889 and the store became Q. A. Scott & Co. Scott bought the building in 1893 and in 1893 he expanded the size. Scott sold the department store in 1899 and the Scott's removed to Boston. Mr. Isaac Stern was the new owner . The store became the "New York Store."

Scott, born in 1851, at the age of 14, was a news agent for the Passumpsic Railroad. Later he became passenger brakeman and baggage master. He then became the conductor on the Boston and

Montreal Airline until 1875. Quincy Scott was the postmaster in Woodsville 1881-1885 and a Colonel in the 1st. Regiment in 1889. Quincy was a Republican and Universalist.

Scruggs ...

*** Henry G. Scruggs is a plumber. Henry and Bertha E. Scruggs removed to Fairlee, Vermont, prior to 1931.

*** Rhett Reynolds Scruggs, born 4-30-1882 in South Carolina, came to Woodsville around 1902-4.

He first worked for Mulliken in the hardware store.

Rhett and N.B. Perkins bought out the plumbing and sheet metal part of Mulliken's business in 1910. Perkins sold out to Scruggs a couple of years later. Rhett moved the business from the Davison Hall to the Brick Block, by the track crossing, on Highland Street.

In 1922 the business was moved to the south end of the Opera Block, So. Court Street side.

Rhett R. Scruggs (1882-1940) is in the plumbing and heating business. Rhett and LeNora Thompson Scruggs (1880-1964) room in the Sargent Block, Central Street. (1915) Rhett and LeNora have a house at 32 Maple Street in 1919. Rhett and LeNora have a house at 41 King Street. (1925 - 1937)

Paul Scruggs, a nephew and graduate of UNH, took over the business after the death of Rhett Scruggs, in 1940.

*** Paul W. Scruggs is employed at 27 South Court Street, the Opera Block, Rhett Scruggs' plumbing and heating business. Paul is boarding at 41 King Street, the home of Rhett and Lenora Scruggs. (1935 - 1937) Paul Scruggs, a nephew of Rhett Scruggs, graduated from UNH and took over the business after the death of Rhett Scruggs, in 1940. Paul presided over the Lions Club in 1942. Paul and Flavia J. Scruggs, and daughter Shirley, have a home at 27 Ammonoosuc Street. (1953 - 1958)

Scruggs Hardware ... This store was relocated on the corner of Beech and Smith Street. (1993-1994)

Sears ... Mrs. Mamie Sears is a house maid, boarding at 155 Central Street, the home of E. A. Sargent. (1925)

Sears Catalog Store ... Sears Catalog store moved from 83 Central Street, now Shadow Box Art & Framing, to this location on

the corner of Smith & Beech Street, the former location of gas stations. This store was operated by Elmer Chamberlin in 1971. In November of that year Mr. and Mrs. David Choate, from Monroe, took over. In 1988 Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Bienvenue and moved the business to the upper end of Smith Street.

Seaver ... James W. Seaver is pastor of the Methodist Church on Pine Street. James and Cora F. Seaver are living at 10 Pine Street. (1919)

Seavey s Garage ... Silvio Pellegrini, proprietor. Auto repairs, Nash auto sales at 7-9 North Court Street. (1953 - 1958) Phone # in 1957 was 7-3763. In 1963 it changed to 747-3763. Advertised "Rambler Sales & Service" in 1960.

Secore ... Lawrence J. Secore is a tea salesman. Lawrence and Norma J. Secore reside at 35b Highland Street. (1956 - 1958)

Secore s Appliance Store ... operated at 12 Highland Street in 1957.

Seery ... John P Seery is a towerman on the railroad. He has a house at 6 Smith Street. (1919)

Selectmen s office ... 65 Central Street, in the Opera Block, second floor in the corner under the town Clock. (1953 - 1955)

Sellers ... Miss Sellers is a registered nurse rooming at 35 Central Street. (1919)

Seguin ... Francis A. Seguin is the manager at the A&P Store at 109 Central Street. Francis is rooming at 13 Maple Street, the home of F. Clyde O'Malley. (1919)

Sevigny ...

*** Aime Sevigny is a machinist in the B&M round house. Aime and Blanche Sevigny have a home at 25 Highland Street. (1929-31)
Aime and Blanche Sevigny have a home at 24 Connecticut Street. (1935 - 1937)

*** Alfred J. Sevigny is a barber at 21 Central Street, Cliff Bassett, hairdressers. Alfred and Gertrude Sevigny have a home at 18 Connecticut Street. (1929-31)

Shaw ... Irving Shaunesey is teaching Typing, Bookkeeping, Stenography and is the Cycle Advisor. 1963

Employed at one of the following businesses; E. B. Mann, Dr. P. E. Speed, Dr. S. K. Dearborn, Dr. F. G. Weeks. Grace is still boarding at 18 Pine Street, the home of George E. Mann. (1929-31) Miss Shaw is superintendent of nurses at Cottage Hospital, on River Road. Grace is rooming at 18 Pine Street, the home of George E. Mann. (1935 - 1937) Grace is retired. (1953 - 1958)

*** Mrs. Isabelle Shaw is a teacher at Woodsville Graded School. (1953 - 1955)

*** Leander M. Shaw is a freight brakeman for the B&M railroad. Leander and Stella Shaw have a House at 6 King Street. (1915) (1919) (1925)

*** Richard E. Shaw is a fireman on the railroad. Richard and Erlene M. Shaw live at 13b School Street. (1953 - 1955) The Shaws' removed to 48 Church Street, Concord, NH, prior to 1956.

Sheean ... Jerry Sheean is a chef at 43 Central Street, the Henderson Hotel, rooming at 133 Central Street, the home of Cyrus Cameron. (1925)

Sheehan ...

*** Harry A. Sheehan is a wiper in the B&M round house. He rooms at J.C. Pennock's on Mill Street (1915).
